The Summer Term Members meeting was held on Monday 14th July. Professor Christopher Jarrold, Professor of Cognitive Development, University of Bristol, delivered a presentation on the topic of "Working memory and language in Down syndrome." The presentation covered current research detailing the working memory challenges for people with Down Syndrome, specifically in relation to verbal working memory and how this impacts on vocabulary learning and strategies which may support. Members discussed implications for their clinical practice, including how working memory challenges were accounted for when completing therapy activities. DS CEN autumn meeting.
